# 'America's Energy' Showcases Industry Leadership at the DNC

EEI partnered with the American Clean Power Association (ACP), the American Gas Association (AGA), and the Nuclear Energy Institute (NEI) to form "America's Energy," a coalition that hosted events at the recent Republican National Convention (RNC) in Milwaukee and the Democratic National Convention (DNC) in Chicago. Through America's Energy, we showcased how EEI's member companies and the energy industry are powering the nation's economy and delivering the future, ensuring energy issues remain at the forefront of the national agenda.

Earlier this month at the DNC, America's Energy joined with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) to host a "Powering Progress" reception featuring remarks from U.S. Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg.

Punchbowl News also hosted an America's Energy CEO Roundtable featuring EEI President and CEO Dan Brouillette, ACP CEO Jason Grumet, AGA President and CEO Karen Harbert, and NEI President and CEO Maria Korsnick. The industry leaders shared their policy priorities and expectations for how the U.S. energy landscape will evolve in the years and decades to come.


"More than 20 percent of new electricity demand between now and 2026 will come from Al and data centers," said Brouillette. "That's going to challenge this industry in a way that it hasn't been challenged in more than 50 years."

### **EEI Supports LIHEAP Action Month**

Millions of American families struggle to afford basic necessities. For these families, the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a vital source of aid, helping them pay their energy bills and avoid having to choose between energy and other essentials, like food or medicine.

Throughout August, EEI and our member companies have emphasized the importance of LIHEAP, an essential, widely supported federal program that delivers critical short-term aid to some of our nation's most vulnerable citizens. LIHEAP distributes funding to states, territories, and tribal governments, which in turn use the funds to help low-income households in their jurisdictions with home heating and cooling costs. LIHEAP funds also are used for emergency situations and for weatherization services.

Unlike some federal assistance programs that see their funding increase with need, like Social Security or food stamps, LIHEAP funding must be appropriated annually by Congress. EEI and the National Energy and Utility Affordability Coalition (NEUAC) are working together to advocate that Congress maintain—and increase—LIHEAP funding. # **Learn More About Consumer Tax Credits and Rebates**

The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) provides several clean energy tax credits and rebates to customers looking to make energy-saving upgrades. Renters and homeowners can take advantage of credits and rebates for high-efficiency appliances, electric vehicles, energy-saving home upgrades like heat pumps and insulation, and more. <u>According to</u>

the U.S. Department of the Treasury and Internal Revenue Service, Americans have claimed "more than \$6 billion in tax credits for residential clean energy investments" and "more than \$2 billion for energy efficiency home improvements" in 2023.

EEI has created a website to help customers understand the potential tax credits and rebate programs available to them through the IRA.

# Electric Companies Remind Customers to Dial 811 Before Digging

On August 11, EEI and our member companies observed 8-1-1 Awareness Day (or Safe Digging Day) by reminding customers to dial 811 before beginning landscaping or other projects that require digging. When customers dial 811, they are connected to state "one call" centers that dispatch professional locators to mark the locations of underground power lines, wires, and pipes.
